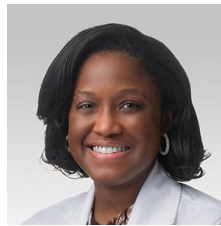


From AM Rounds to PM Notes: How Implicit Bias in Health Care Affects Patient Outcomes
